We're excited to see our students step out of their comfort zones and truly learn by doing.










Final Year Retreats










LEARNING & INSIGHTS

This approach ensures students develop essential skills while connecting historical and cultural knowledge to contemporary contexts.









Grade VI students engaged in a unique, authentic task inspired by the Mauryan Empire's Ashokan Edicts. As the "Head of School," students created modern edicts to promote discipline and responsible digital time usage at home and school. Through creative mediums like scrolls, chart papers, and visually engaging designs, students developed practical solutions on topics such as screen time limits, PE hours, and class schedules. This hands-on activity not only fostered creativity and collaboration but also encouraged critical thinking and the application of historical practices to modern challenges. A testament to Ekya's commitment to experiential learning.

As part of the Grade VII unit on the **Idea of Citizenship**, students engaged in a hands-on activity to explore civic responsibilities and community engagement. How Parents and Educators Can Help

Foster Open Discussions

Encourage children to reflect on what truly matters—meaningful relationships, personal growth, and simple joys. Ask questions like, "What made you feel proud today?" instead of "What did your friends buy?"

Highlight Non-Material Joys

Celebrate experiences that don't cost money—a family game night, a hike, or volunteering. When children see adults valuing these moments, they learn to appreciate them too.

Lead by Example

Children mimic what they see. If parents and teachers show contentment without chasing luxury—and treat people with equal respect regardless of status—kids absorb those values naturally.

Reinforce Values in Education

Schools can integrate lessons on empathy, resilience, and ethical living into the curriculum. Recognising kindness and effort as much as academic success helps balance societal pressures.

Encourage Authentic Friendships

Guide children toward friendships based on shared interests and values, not social status. A diverse social circle helps them see beyond materialism.

Material influences will always exist, but children grounded in strong values can engage with the world confidently—admiring its sparkle without mistaking it for true worth. Our role is to help them build that inner compass.



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
